



## The Reflection (required)

Discuss these to go deeper, and more personal, into applying the Point

- •Have you ever purchased something that ended up costing much more than you thought it would? Share the story.
- •In Matthew 9:9-13, we see that Matthew (aka Levi) was a Jew who worked for the Roman empire as a cheating tax collector! When Jesus called Matthew to be His disciple, Jesus was accused of spending time with "sinners". To be clear, let's look at how God sees sinners:
  - •*Sin Is Universal* Read Romans 3:23; 5:12,18-19 •The Pharisees called Matthew & his friends "*those* sinners", but
    - according to these verses, <u>who</u> is a sinner?
  - Sin Is Personal Read Romans 3:9-12; 1 Timothy 1:15-16; 1 John 1:10
    Do you consider yourself or others to be a "good person"? What do these passages actually say about being "good"?
  - Sin Is Punishable Read Romans 6:23; James 5:19-20
    In our culture, we don't like to talk about consequences, but to ignore them would be even worse! What is the consequence/result of our sin? What is the danger of ignoring this?
  - Sin Is Forgivable Read Romans 5:8; 2 Corinthians 5:21
    - •Despite being a sinner destined for hell, what is the hope that Jesus offers? According to **Ephesians 2:8-9**, <u>how</u> do we receive that hope? [by *believing* in Jesus; not by earning it]
- •Despite Matthew's past as a tax collector, God still used him! <u>Have</u> <u>your group explain</u> these passages of what God did though Matthew
  - He was an Associate of "the Sinners"! Read Luke 5:29
    Have you ever considered that God may want to use your past as a unique opportunity to reach people for Jesus that others can't?
  - He was an Apostle of the Church! Read Matthew 10:2-4; Acts 1:12-14
    He was an Author of the Bible! Read Matthew 17:24,27; 18:24
- *B-Sides* is all about God using people despite their failures, so each week we're going to ask a similar question: How does God using Matthew despite his past, make you feel about God in *your* life?
