

# The Repeats (required) They are the same, but *WE* change, so <u>please</u> <u>discuss</u> these with your group

- •Read 2 Timothy 2:15. How has this series so far changed how you understand and study the Bible? What does 2 Timothy 3:16-17 add?
- •Use the passages below to complete the following exercises on Studying the Bible and Understanding the Testaments. [Answer ALL of the questions for the first passage, then start over with the second\*]
  - Joshua 3:1-17

- •1 Corinthians 12:12-27
- •As a group, read the passage and discover these observations:
  - Who is in it?
  - When does it take place?
  - Why is it happening?
- What is being discussed?
- Where does it happen?
- How is it to be done?
- •Next consider the <u>interpretation</u>. What do each of these gaps mean and which need to be answered in the passage?
  - The Chronology Gap
  - •The Cultural Gap
  - •The Literary Gap

- The Geography Gap
- •The Linguistic Gap
- The Supernatural Gap
- •Now let's discuss the passage in light of the Old and New Testaments (Covenants). It a <u>promise to us</u>, or is it a <u>principle for us</u>?
  - •Who is it Regarding? (Is it for Christ-followers [church] or Israel?)
  - •When is it Repeated? (Is it *quoted* elsewhere to the church?)
  - Where is it Reinforced? (Is the same concept used for the church?)
  - •Is it Reputation? (Is it about God's character? see Hebrews 13:8)
- •With that in mind, what promise OR principle does the passage teach?
- •Use that promise/principle to come up with 5 ways that we can <u>apply</u> this passage. The <u>interpretation</u> is *one*, the <u>applications</u> are *many*!
